

Dr. Alam earned his MBBS from Chittagong Medical College. He holds an FCPS in Medicine and a Doctorate of Medicine (MD) in Hepatology.

Beginning his medical career in 1995, he served in various capacities, including Assistant Surgeon at Hatia Upazila Health Complex, Junior Consultant of Medicine at Patuakhali General Hospital, and Registrar of Medicine at Sher-e-Bangla Medical College Hospital. Since 2003, he has been a faculty member at BSMMU.

Dr. Alam has authored over 160 publications, including 92 full articles in national and international journals. He has presented research papers at 15 international conferences across countries such as the UK, Singapore, India, Australia, China, Japan, South Korea, Malaysia, Indonesia, the Philippines, Turkey, and Hong Kong.

Dr. Alam is a pioneer in the study of MAFLD in Bangladesh. He co-authored the 2020 "Clinical Practice Guidelines for the Diagnosis and Management of Metabolic Associated Fatty Liver Disease" for the Asia-Pacific region. He has collaborated with scientists from 29 countries, including Australia, Japan, China, Singapore, South Korea, Pakistan, India, and Bangladesh.

Dr. Alam is a member of this U.S.-based organization comprising leading hepatology scientists worldwide. He received several international awards, including: Asian Pacific Association for the Study of the Liver (APASL): 2004, American Association for the Study of the Liver (AASLD): 2008, USA-Japan Joint Medical Science Award (USJMSCP-NIH-APASL): 2009, Travel Bursary Awards: in Indonesia (2005), China (2010), and Turkey (2015).

Dr. Alam acting as Course Coordinator and Member Secretary of the Curriculum Committee for the MD Hepatology course & significantly contributed to developing the "Residency-Based" curriculum initiated in 2011 at BMU. He serves as the Member Secretary of the Institutional Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) of the Department of Hepatology at BSMMU, focusing on evaluating and upgrading academic programs.

Prof A K Azad Khan graduated from Dhaka Medical College in 1965. He obtained fellowship from College of Physicians & Surgeons, Pakistan in 1970 & D. Phil from University of Oxford in 1977. During his D. Phil research, he invented of 5 ASA-based drugs which is still the main long term treatment for Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD). He was awarded Honoris Causa from the University of Basel, Switzerland in 1999, honorary FRCP from Royal College of Physician in 2001, fellow of the Bangladesh Academy of Sciences in 2001 and honorary Fellow of the University College London in 2012.

Prof. Khan also played a key role in planning and development of various Projects and Affiliates of the Diabetic Association of Bangladesh (BADAS) in general and BIRDEM in particular, including the creation of BIRDEM-2, National HealthCare Network (NHN), Ibrahim Cardiac Center and Research Institute (ICHRI), BIHS General Hospital, Ibrahim Medical College, BIRDEM Nursing College and Bangladesh University of Health Sciences (BUHS). He was elected Secretary General of the Diabetic Association of Bangladesh in the year 1998 and was elected the President of the Association in 2007(Continuing). He is now Chairman, Board of Trustees, Bangladesh University of Health Sciences, Chairman, Governing Body, Ibrahim Medical College.

In addition he was the Founder General Secretary, later the President, and is now the Honorary President for Life of the Bangladesh Endocrine Society. He was also founder President of the Bangladesh Gastroenterology Society and now serves as its Honorary President (for Life). Pre Liver Transplant Assessment – Donor & Recipient of Liver Transplant

Liver transplantation (LT) is the only curative management in end stage liver disease. Most common indications are decompensated cirrhosis of liver with major complications, HCC and acute liver failure. The decision to list a patient for transplantation is a risk-benefit analysis in which the inherent risks of surgery, recurrent disease, and long-term immunosuppression must be weighed against the potential benefits of transplantation. The goal of the pretransplantation evaluation is to assess the patient's ability to tolerate the stress of surgery, immunosuppression, and the demands of post-transplantation care.

Patients should be selected if expected survival in the absence of LT is less than one year or if the patient had an unacceptable quality of life because of liver disease. Due to scarcity of liver donors worldwide, MELD score is widely used for predicting short term mortality of cirrhosis of liver and to prepare a 'priority list' in waiting list candidates for optimal timing of LT to reduce mortality and improve success rate.

Each patient undergoes metabolic screening, an extensive cardiopulmonary evaluation, screening for occult infection or cancer, and psychosocial evaluation. Specific testing varies depending on the patient's age, medical history, and transplantation center practice.

Living donor LT is an equally efficacious therapeutic option compared to deceased donor LT. Donor safety is the central issue during evaluation. The standard donor should be ABO compatible with the recipient, acceptable age range is 18-55 years, BMI 18-28 kg/m2, BMI > 30 kg/m2 or with associated two metabolic syndrome requires liver biopsy to exclude steatohepatitis. Candidates with well-controlled diabetes mellitus, hypo/ hyperthyroidism, hypertension and asthma can be considered for liver donation. History of Coronary artery disease or cerebrovascular accidents are contraindications for liver donation. During donor evaluation adequate hepatic parenchymal volume, vascular inflow, venous outflow and biliary drainage are evaluated for the proposed partial allograft and donor remnant (minimum 30%). Partial hepatectomy is a safe procedure and adequate counseling is ensured to overcome any possible psychological consequences.

With proper pretransplant assessment optimal patient selection and optimal timing for LT is assessed and also identify issues that may impair a successful outcome after transplantation.

Establishing a Living Donor Liver Transplantation (LDLT) Program: Strategic Framework and Operational Insights

Background: Liver transplantation is a definitive treatment for end-stage liver disease and selected hepatic malignancies. With a growing discrepancy between the number of patients requiring transplantation and the availability of deceased donor organs, especially in low- and middle-income countries, Living Donor Liver Transplantation (LDLT) has emerged as a viable and often essential alternative. However, the complexity of LDLT demands comprehensive planning, multidisciplinary collaboration, and resource-intensive infrastructure.

Objective: To present a structured and practical roadmap for initiating a successful LDLT program, with specific considerations for resource-constrained settings such as Bangladesh, where the need for liver transplants is high but programmatic establishment remains limited.

Methods and Approach: Drawing from clinical experience and global standards, the presentation delineates key requirements across four domains: (1) Personnel – assembling a trained core team of surgeons, anesthesiologists, hepatologists, and intensivists; (2) Infrastructure – equipping operating theaters and transplant ICUs with modular layouts, HEPA filtration, advanced monitoring tools, and critical care resources; (3) Process – establishing SOPs, donor and recipient selection protocols, and perioperative management guidelines; and (4) Support – ensuring access to interventional radiology, blood bank services, laboratory monitoring (e.g., tacrolimus levels), and a strong transplant coordination framework.

Key Considerations: Initial cases should involve low-risk recipients and donors with favorable anatomy to reduce technical complexity. Institutional commitment, long-term team training (including exposure at high-volume centers), and cost-management strategies—such as public-private partnerships—are critical for sustainability. Special emphasis is placed on the role of leadership, intraoperative vigilance, and multidisciplinary synergy to ensure quality and patient safety.

Conclusion: Starting an LDLT program involves more than surgical readiness—it requires a systems-level strategy encompassing personnel development, infrastructure planning, and procedural rigor. With appropriate training, planning, and institutional support, high-quality LDLT programs can be established even in resource-limited environments, ultimately improving survival and quality of life for patients with end-stage liver disease.

Post Transplant Assessment, Post Operative Care & Challenges

Liver transplantation is a life-saving procedure that requires meticulous post-operative management to ensure long-term graft function and patient survival. Post-transplant care begins immediately after surgery and continues throughout the recipient's life.

Immediate Postoperative Period

The immediate post-transplant period extends from the patient's discharge from the operating room to the first three months post-surgery. During first few days, patients are monitored in specialized units equipped for liver transplant recovery. Key components of early care include:

- Ventilation and Weaning: In most LT units- patient is shifted to ICU on mechanical ventilator.
 But extubation is possible in OT, if all the parameters are favorable. Early extubation associated with reduced complications.
- Hemodynamic and Invasive Monitoring: Tools such as central venous lines and pulmonary artery catheters are utilized to closely monitor cardiovascular status.
- Electrolyte and Fluid Balance: Careful correction of disturbances like hyperkalemia, hyponatremia, and hypocalcemia is essential.
- Graft Surveillance: Doppler studies, liver function tests, and drain monitoring help assess graft viability and early complication detection.

Pharmacologic Management

Immunosuppression

Immunosuppressive therapy is central to preventing rejection. The regimen typically includes:

- Calcineurin Inhibitors (CNI): Tacrolimus or cyclosporine
- Adjunct Agents: Mycophenolate mofetil, mTOR inhibitors, and corticosteroids
- Triple Therapy: May be used initially, combining CNI, anti-metabolite, and steroids

Side effects, including nephrotoxicity, metabolic disturbances, and cytopenias, necessitate regular monitoring and dose adjustments.

Infection Prophylaxis

Liver transplant recipients are highly susceptible to infections. Prophylactic antibiotics, antifungals, and antiviral agents are administered, with regimens adjusted based on culture reports and risk profiles. Vaccination and latent infection screening are vital pre and post-transplant strategies.

Monitoring and Complications

Rejection

Three types of rejection may occur:

- Antibody-Mediated Rejection (AMR)
- T-cell Mediated Acute Rejection
- Chronic Ductopenic Rejection

Management involves immunosuppressive escalation, including corticosteroids, plasmapheresis, and biologic therapies.

Graft Dysfunction

Early dysfunction can arise from ischemia-reperfusion injury or technical complications. Late dysfunction often involves chronic rejection, recurrent disease, or metabolic complications.

Nutritional and Supportive Care

Nutritional support begins with early nasogastric feeding, transitioning to a high-calorie, high-protein diet to support healing and liver regeneration. Pain management, drain care, and thromboembolism prophylaxis are integral aspects of early recovery. N-acetyl cysteine (NAC) infusion is also used to reduce reperfusion injury and improve liver enzyme profiles.

Long-Term Care

Metabolic and Cardiovascular Health

Long-term care focuses heavily on managing metabolic syndrome, including:

- Diabetes Mellitus
- Hypertension
- Dyslipidemia
- Obesity

Lifestyle modifications and medical therapies are tailored to mitigate cardiovascular risks, which are leading causes of late mortality.

Renal Health

Chronic kidney disease is common due to prolonged CNI use, requiring routine renal function assessment and potential immunosuppression adjustment.

Cancer Surveillance

Liver transplant recipients are at increased risk for de novo malignancies due to chronic immunosuppression. Regular cancer screenings, including for skin, colorectal, and lymphoproliferative disorders, are recommended.

Recurrence of Primary Disease

Diseases like hepatitis B, hepatitis C, autoimmune hepatitis, and primary sclerosing cholangitis can recur and require disease-specific management protocols.

Psychosocial and Reproductive Health

Post-transplant patients may face psychological challenges, including anxiety, depression, or substance abuse relapse. A multidisciplinary approach with psychiatric support is essential. Additionally, women of childbearing age should receive counseling on contraception and pregnancy planning.

Conclusion

Post-transplant care is a multifaceted continuum that extends far beyond the surgical procedure. It requires a collaborative, multidisciplinary approach to monitor organ function, prevent and treat complications, and support overall patient well-being. Early intervention in modifiable risk factors, vigilant monitoring, and individualized therapy remain the cornerstones of successful long-term outcomes in liver transplant recipients

Role of Interventional Radiology (IR) in Liver Transplant

Interventional radiology (IR) plays a vital role in liver transplantation by offering minimally invasive diagnostic and therapeutic tools that help improve patient outcomes and reduce the need for more invasive surgical interventions.

Interventional radiologists work closely with other members of the transplant team (surgeons, hepatologists, etc) to provide comprehensive and effective care for liver transplants patients.

Infection Prevention and Control in Liver Transplantation

Patients undergoing liver transplantation face a heightened risk of infectious complications throughout their treatment. Hospitals considering liver transplant programs should therefore have a robust infection prevention and control program. Key elements for a successful program include: a) a defined reporting structure with an IPC committee, dedicated personnel, and allocated budget and resources; b) evidence-based practices; and c) regular surveillance with feedback. To maintain the program long-term, a comprehensive education and training program is essential. The World Health Organization offers excellent resources for both program implementation and training.

It is preferable to cohort transplant patients in a separate unit. Maintaining the air and water quality within this unit would help prevent fungal and waterborne bacterial infections. Pre-transplant infection prevention and control (IPC) begins with proper screening for acute and chronic infections in both donor and recipient; the results will guide preventative strategies such as isolation, vaccination, prophylaxis, and preemptive therapy. During transplantation, strict barrier precautions and the central sterile supply department also play vital roles. Patient and family counseling regarding lifestyle adjustments is essential to minimize the risk of post-transplant environmental exposure.

Liver Transplantation in India and the Way Forward for Bangladesh Ramdip Ray

Introduction: My journey in this field began in Calcutta, a city in the eastern part of India, a region that, like many others, witnessed the gradual evolution of liver transplant programs. Today, I will share insights into the development of liver transplantation in India, the lessons learned, and the potential path forward for nations like Bangladesh as they embark on this critical medical journey.

The Evolution of Liver Transplantation in India: Liver transplantation in the Indian subcontinent truly began in the Delhi and later expanded to the southern part of the country. The eastern and western regions, including my hometown of Calcutta, were slower to adopt this. As a surgeon with a focus on gastrointestinal, liver, pancreatic, and bile duct surgeries, I was naturally drawn to liver transplantation—a procedure widely regarded as the most complex operation performed on the human body. Living donor liver transplantation (LDLT), in particular, stands out as an even more intricate endeavor.

Driven by the desire to master this challenging field, I pursued specialized training in Delhi and returned to establish the first full-fledged, independent liver transplant program in eastern India. Today, India has emerged as a global hub for liver transplantation, performing among the largest number of such procedures worldwide. However, this success has not been without its share of mistakes—lessons that newer programs, like those in Bangladesh, can learn from.

Learning from Global Experiences: The Western world, despite its advanced medical infrastructure, has faced challenges in fully integrating living donor programs. As a result, many patients continue to suffer due to the shortage of organs. In contrast, India has achieved remarkable success in living donor transplants, which constitute nearly 80% of all liver transplants performed in the country. While this showcases surgical excellence, it also highlights an imbalance—the ideal scenario would involve a more equitable distribution between living donor transplants (30-40%) and deceased donor or cadaver transplants (50-60%).

Recent initiatives in regions like the Middle East, particularly in Abu Dhabi, demonstrate the potential of deceased donor programs. These programs have achieved significant success, proving that with the right infrastructure and policies, cadaver transplants can thrive.

The Way Forward for Bangladesh: For Bangladesh, the journey into liver transplantation must be strategic and multifaceted. Here are the key steps to ensure success:

- 1. Collaboration Between Government and Private Sectors: Liver transplant programs should be established both in government-run university teaching hospitals, army hospitals, and private corporate hospitals. This dual approach will ensure accessibility and scalability.
- 2. Balancing Living and Deceased Donor Transplants: Bangladesh must prioritize both living donor and deceased donor programs from the outset. While biases against deceased donor transplants exist globally, these can be overcome through education, awareness, and robust legal frameworks.
- 3. Learning from Global Mistakes: By studying the experiences of India, the West, and the Middle East, Bangladesh can avoid common pitfalls and adopt best practices. This includes creating a transparent organ allocation system, investing in training for medical professionals, and fostering public trust in transplantation.

Conclusion: In closing, the field of liver transplantation is a testament to human ingenuity and collaboration. For Bangladesh, the time to act is now. By leveraging the lessons of others, fostering partnerships across sectors, and embracing both living and deceased donor models, Bangladesh can quickly make its mark on the liver transplant map. This will be a boon to thousands of patients suffering from the scourge of end stage liver disease.

Understanding Acute Pancreatitis: Etiology, Mechanisms, and Management

Acute pancreatitis is a sudden inflammation of the pancreas, often caused by gallstones, alcohol use, or hyperlipidemia. The pathophysiology involves the premature activation of pancreatic enzymes, leading to autodigestion of pancreatic tissue, inflammation, and systemic complications like SIRS and organ failure.

Common causes include gallstones (40-70%), alcohol (20-30%), and hyperlipidemia, with other factors like trauma, infections, and medications also contributing.

Diagnosis involves elevated amylase and lipase levels, imaging (CT scan, ultrasound), and tests for underlying conditions (e.g., triglycerides, liver function tests).

Management is primarily supportive, with IV fluids, pain control, and early enteral feeding. Treatment of underlying causes (e.g., cholecystectomy for gallstones) and addressing complications like infection or organ failure may require specific interventions. Severe cases may require surgical or endoscopic procedures. Prognosis varies, with mild cases recovering fully, while severe cases can lead to significant morbidity.

Chronic Pancreatitis – An Overview

Chronic pancreatitis (CP) is a permanent and irreversible condition characterized by chronic inflammation, fibrosis, and destruction of exocrine (acinar cells) and endocrine (islets of Langerhans) tissues.

This overview highlights the epidemiology, clinical presentation, diagnostic approaches, and therapeutic options for CP, emphasizing a multidisciplinary approach to patient care.

Its prevalence in Western industrialized countries is estimated at 10–15 per 100,000 population, with an annual incidence of 3.5–4 per 100,000.

Clinical features include abdominal pain, malabsorption, and diabetes mellitus.

Diagnosis involves functional tests (direct hormone stimulation and indirect tests) and structural assessments.

Management focuses on addressing pain, exocrine pancreatic insufficiency (EPI), and endocrine insufficiency. Treatment strategies include analgesics, reduced fat intake, lipase and vitamin supplementation, and medium-chain triglycerides. Surgical intervention is indicated for complications such as biliary or pancreatic strictures, duodenal stenosis, fistulas, hemorrhage, intractable pain, pseudocysts, suspected neoplasms, or vascular issues.

The Role of Endoscopic Therapy in the Management of Pancreatic Diseases: Indications and Outcomes

Endoscopic therapy has become a well-established, minimally invasive treatment option for selected patients with pancreatic diseases, including acute and chronic pancreatitis and their complications.

A range of classical and modified endoscopic techniques are employed as part of a comprehensive therapeutic approach in this field. These endoscopic methods are particularly indicated in cases of acute biliary pancreatitis and localized complications of acute pancreatitis (AP). Additionally, pancreatic endotherapy has demonstrated efficacy in certain patients with idiopathic AP.

As an integral component of multidisciplinary management, endoscopic interventions offer a less invasive alternative with favorable outcomes in appropriate setting.

Ongoing advancements in endoscopic techniques continue to expand its role in pancreatic disease management.

Diagnosed with Primary Adrenal Insufficiency? Search Adrenoleukodystrophy- two Brothers Presented with Similar Phenotype

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X-linked adrenoleukodystrophy (X-ALD) is a genetic disease with a variety of phenotypic expression. This is the first case report of X-AMN/ALD in two brothers in Bangladesh confirmed by raised VLCFA. Our index patient of 19 years presented on 2014 with adrenal insufficiency, after one year developed progressive spastic paraparesis along with cognitive declination and behavioral abnormality. His only brother was clinically asymptomatic at presentation with Addison's disease and extensor plantar reflexes. After three years of follow up, index patient became bed bound with slurred speech, urinary urge incontinence and his brother developed spastic paraparesis with cognitive impairment. None had gonadal impairment. Follow up MRI after three years revealed lesion in brainstem in both along with atrophy of thoracic segment of spinal cord in index patient and cerebellum, internal capsule involvement in his brother. Both were of pure AMN variety but due to presence of cognitive impairment and behavioral abnormality they can be categorized as cerebral variety of AMN. On 2023, our index patient is still surviving with major functional disability and his brother died on 2019, 5 years of initial diagnosis.

Ileal Aspirates: A Novel Sample for Diagnosis of Intestinal Tuberculosis

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Background: Over recent few years, the incidence of tuberculosis and intestinal TB (ITB) has markedly raised due to population migration, MDR-TB, HIV infection, use of immunosuppressive agents and biologics. Over and under diagnosis are also common, especially in developing countries like Bangladesh. As the terminal ileum is the most common site of ITB, Ileal fluid can be aspirated by colonoscopy with better diagnostic yielding. This study was aimed to evaluate the efficacy of ileal aspirates as a novel sample in diagnosis of Intestinal Tuberculosis at a tertiary care hospital in Bangladesh.

Materials & Methods: This was a cross sectional analytical study performed over 01 year period. We have studied 200 suspected ITB patients with 04 different investigation tools; Ileal aspirates for Gene Xpert, Stool Gene Xpert, Endoscopic or surgical Biopsy for histopathology and Endoscopic or surgical Biopsy for GeneXpert. At first we have collected biopsy from terminal ileum. Then we have collected 10 ml of ileal aspirates by direct aspiration through jejunal feeding tube from terminal ileum during colonoscopy and sent it for GeneXpert. We also completed other tests as per rules. ITB diagnosed patients were followed up for clinical improvement and treatment response for next two months. The sensitivity, specificity, positive predictive value (PPV), and negative predictive value (NPV) and diagnostic accuracy of each test were calculated.

Results: Finally 96 of them were diagnosed as confirmed ITB and 104 were other diagnosis. Ileal aspirates showed 80.21%, 77.88%, 77.00%, 81.00% and 79.00% sensitivity, specificity, PPV, NPV and diagnostic accuracy respectively, which was quite better than other modalities.

Stool GeneXpert showed 69.79%, 73.08%, 70.53%, 72.38% and 71.50% sensitivity, specificity, PPV, NPV and diagnostic accuracy respectively.

Colonoscopic/Surgical biopsy - HPR showed 42.71%, 69.23%, 56.16%, 56.69% and 56.50% sensitivity, specificity, PPV, NPV and diagnostic accuracy respectively.

Colonoscopic /surgical biopsy GeneXpert showed 76.04%, 70.19%, 70.19%, 76.04% and 73.50% sensitivity, specificity, PPV, NPV and diagnostic accuracy respectively.

Conclusion: Diagnosis of ITB is challenging, especially where ITB and Crohn's disease both are common in community and can present in same patient simultaneously. Ileal Aspirates can help better to detect bacteriological presence in intestine and thus we can confidently diagnose ITB with better differentiation from Crohn's disease. This sample can be taken easily while on colonoscopy along with biopsy materials.

Diagnostic Role of CA 19-9, CA 19-9/CRP Ratio and CA 19-9/Total Bilirubin Ratio in Differentiating Benign and Malignant Obstructive Jaundice

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Background: Serum carbohydrate antigen (CA19-9) is a tumour marker which is significantly elevated in biliary and pancreatic malignancy. It is also increased in some benign conditions associated with jaundice. So many strategies have been recommended to improve the power of CA 19-9 to differentiate benign and malignant obstructive jaundice. This study was carried out to explore the diagnostic role of CA19-9, CA19-9/CRP ratio and CA19-9/total bilirubin ratio in differentiating benign and malignant obstructive jaundice.

Materials & Methods: The present cross sectional analytical study was conducted at Department of Gastrointestinal, Hepatobiliary and Pancreatic Disorders (GHPD), BIRDEM General Hospital, Bangladesh. It included 60 patients with obstructive jaundice diagnosed by clinical, laboratory and radiological investigations. They were divided into two groups; benign (n=29) and malignant (n=31). The nature of obstructive jaundice was obtained by ultrasonography, CT scan, MRCP, ERCP, tumour marker and histopathology. All patients were tested for CA19-9, CRP and serum bilirubin. Data were analysed using SPSS version-25.0 software.

Results: The mean±SD age (years) of the benign group was 56.90±15.80 and malignant group was 56.97±12.60. The ROC analysis for CA19-9 yielded sensitivity, specificity, positive predictive value (PPV), negative predictive value (NPV) and accuracy of CA19-9 at cut-off value 70 U/ml were 71%, 49%, 60%, 61% and 61% respectively and area under the curve (AUC) was 0.625. The CA19-9/CRP ratio showed sensitivity, specificity, PPV, NPV and accuracy at cut-off value 5.2 were 80%, 97%, 96%, 82% and 88% respectively and AUC was 0.910. The CA19-9/total bilirubin ratio showed sensitivity, specificity, PPV, NPV and accuracy of at cut-off value 17 were 58%, 51%, 56%, 53% and 55% respectively and AUC was 0.509.

Conclusion: CA 19-9/CRP ratio had high diagnostic value in differentiating benign and malignant obstructive jaundice than CA19-9 alone and CA19-9/total bilirubin ratio.

Association of Anxiety and Depression with Disease Activity in IBD Patient

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Background: Inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) including Crohn's disease (CD) and ulcerative colitis (UC) is a chronic and disabling disease with unknown aetiology. There is evidence that anxiety and depression are more common in the patient with IBD and the symptoms of these conditions are more severe during periods of active disease. This study was done to observe the relationship among anxiety, depression and disease activity in IBD patient.

Materials and Methods: This cross sectional analytical study was carried out in the department of Gastroenterology, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, Dhaka from January 2019 to March 2020 on 140 patients of IBD, diagnosed previously based on endoscopy, histopathology and/or imaging, aged between 18 and 80 years, admitted under the department and those who came in IBD clinic. Patients with IBD who had coexistent comorbidity affecting the mental status and known psychiatric disorder were excluded. Disease activity was evaluated using the Hervay Bradshaw Index for CD and Ulcerative Colitis Activity Index for UC. DASS 21 Bangla version was use for evaluation of depression and anxiety. Data analysis was performed by using Statistical Package for the Social Sciences version 23 (SPSS 23). Chi-square test was used to compare categorical variables between group A (IBD with anxiety and/or depression) and group B (IBD without anxiety and/or depression) at 5% level of significant. P value <0.05 is taken as significant.

Results: 140 participants were included: 30% female; 46.4% Crohn's Disease (CD); 53.6ulcerative colitis (UC); It was observed that age range of IBD patients was 18-80 years. CD subject were significantly younger than UC at the time of study (mean \pm SD) 33.18 ± 9.38 years versus 38.21 ± 11.67 (p - 0.006). Measurement of association of anxiety and depression with disease activity in IBD is significantly associated with anxiety (p -<0.001) and depression (<0.001). Low income, long disease duration and active disease are significantly associated with depression (OR-3.539, 2.985, 5.307 respectively with 95% CI). Low income, disease activities are associated with anxiety (OR- 4.810, 4.387 with 95% CI).

Conclusion: This study shows a close relationship between disease activity and anxiety and depression in IBD patient. Psychological evaluation is necessary for the management of IBD patient. Besides this, anxiety and depression should be considered one of the critical goals in the treatment planning whenever an IBD patient shows an exacerbation of disease.

Correlation between Fibroscan and Laboratory Tests for Assessing Liver Fibrosis in Non-alcoholic Fatty Liver Disease Patients

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Background: Non-alcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD) is the most common liver disease worldwide which may cause liver fibrosis and cirrhosis. Fibroscan has high sensitivity (92%) and specificity (84%) to detect liver fibrosis. However, considering the cost and availability of Fibroscan is a challenge in a resource-constrained setting, laboratory tests like the Fibrosis-4 index (FIB-4), aspartate to platelet ratio (APRI), and aspartate transaminase to alanine transaminase ratio (AST/ALT) can be an alternative to liver Fibroscan in these circumstances. Considering this, we aim to compare these laboratory tests with Fibroscan for fibrosis staging in non-alcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD) patients.

Materials & Methods: This prospective cross-sectional study was conducted from December 2023 to October 2024 at the National Gastroliver Institute and Hospital, Dhaka, Bangladesh. Two groups were made based on Fibroscan results of non-significant fibrosis (F0-F1, kPa ≤7.5) and significant fibrosis (F2-F4, kPa >7.5). The optimal cut-off of all three tests was also determined using the ROC curves.

Results: A total of 203 NAFLD patients were analyzed for this study, 132(65%) were males and the mean age was 46.6 \pm 13.5 years. The mean BMI was 27.8kg/m². Of those, 54.2% had dyslipidemia, 45.8% diabetes, and 31.3% hypertension. Non-significant fibrosis (kPa \leq 7.5) was found in 139(68.5%) patients and significant fibrosis (kPa \geq 7.5) in 64(31.5%) patients.

A significant positive correlation was found between FibroScan score and FIB-4 (r=0.357, p<0.0001), APRI (r=0.457, p<0.0001); however, the correlation was weak for AST/ALT ratio (r =0.141, p=0.05). AUROCs curves for FIB-4, APRI, and AST/ALT for significant fibrosis (kPa >7.5) were 0.747 (p<0.0001), 0.751 (p<0.0001), and 0.602 (p=0.02), respectively. Sensitivity and specificity of APRI at the 0.43 cut-off for the differentiation of significant fibrosis were 73.4% and 71.9%; FIB-4 at the 1.3 cut-off 71.9% and 70.5%; and AST/ALT at the 1.19 cut-off 50% and 64% respectively.

Conclusion: This study showed that FIB-4 and APRI have a positive correlation with fibrosis staging in NAFLD patients. FIB-4 and APRI have higher accuracy compared to AST/ALT. So, in the resource-constrained settings where FibroScan is unavailable, APRI and FIB-4 can be valuable tools for identifying patients at higher risk of significant fibrosis.

Prevalence of Peptic Ulcer Disease among the Decompensated Cirrhotic Patients Attending for Endoscopic Screening in a Tertiary Care Hospital: A Retrospective Cohort Study

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Background: Non-variceal bleeding from Peptic ulcer disease accounts for significant mortality in decompensated liver cirrhosis patients. This study aimed to determine the prevalence of Peptic ulcer disease among patients while screening endoscopy for possible variceal ligation.

Materials and Methods: This retrospective cohort study was done at the National Gastroliver Institute & Hospital based on the available data records of 268 adult decompensated cirrhotic patients from January 2023 to December 2023. These patients attended for endoscopic screening for possible variceal ligation. During endoscopy, gastric ulcers, erosions, duodenal ulcers, and erosions were considered peptic ulcer diseases. Esophageal varices were classified as small, medium, and large, and gastric varices were classified according to the Sarin Classification. Quantitative variables were compared using the Student's t-test. The Chi-square test analyzed categorical data. All the statistical analyses were done using SPSS 26.0 (SPSS, Chicago, IL, USA). A P-value <0.05 was considered statistically significant.

Results: Among the 268 patients, 197 were males, while 71 were females. The mean age of the patient was 48.19±SD13.08. The etiologies were found to be HBV 112 (41.8%), HCV 24 (9%), NASH 68 (25.37%), and others like Wilson's disease, hemochromatosis, secondary biliary cirrhosis, or unknown 64 (23.9%). The types of varices encountered were large-sized varices 180 (67.16%), medium-sized varices 76 (28.36%), and small-sized varices 16 (5.97%). GOV-1 was the most common type of gastric varix, 17(6.34%). Among the 268 cirrhotic patients, 39 patients (14.55%) had peptic ulcer disease. Differences between age, sex, etiology, and types of gastric varices were not statistically significant. However, the difference between patients having peptic ulcer disease and not having peptic ulcer disease with small, medium, and large size varices was found statistically significant (P <0.001).

Conclusion: Prevalence of peptic ulcer disease among the cirrhotic patients undergoing screening endoscopy for possible variceal ligation was found to be 14.55%. Future prospective studies are needed to detect the actual prevalence of peptic ulcer disease among those patients.

A Child Presented With Increased Bowel Frequency

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Background: primary spinal cord tumors are very rare (incidence 0.26/100,000 person/years) in children and adolescents (0-19 years), commonly presents with low back pain, pain radiating to thigh/knee, lower extremity numbness/weakness, urinary dysfunction and abnormal gait. Here we presented a case of spinal cord tumor in sacral region presented with neurogenic bowel which is very rare in paediatric age group.

Materials & Methods: A 5-years-old girl from Dhaka presented with increased bowel frequency, 8-12 times/day, semi-solid for 2 years without any systemic or neurological complaints. On query, her parents disclosed history of urinary retention 2 years back which improved with intermittent self-catheterization over 3 months with subsequent normal bladder habit for 2 years. General examination, vital parameters were normal. Anal area appeared normal with reduced anal tone. Neurological examination including motor, sensory examination of both lower limbs and other systems revealed normal.

Results: CBC, RBS, TSH, creatinine, electrolytes, CXR, USG of whole abdomen, stool R/E, culture, colonoscopy were normal. MRI of lumbosacral spine (sagittal proton cast T1W1) (Figure1a) revealed a heterogeneous, iso-intermediate intense (in comparison to normal spinal cord) lobulated mass at S2-S5, with mild inhomogeneous enhancement on post contrast T1W1 (Figure1b). It extended delineated as mild heterogeneous, hyperintense lobulated lesion in sagittal T2W1 (Figure1c) suggesting intracanulicular myxopapillary ependymoma. The adjacent vertebral disk heights were normal without any sign of tethered cord or disc herniation. After laminectomy an extradural tumour (S1-S4) was removed near totally (Figure1de), histopathology revealed cellular ependymoma (WHO grade II). Leukocyte common antigen, CD20, CD3 was negative. It was followed by palliative Radiotherapy (Total T.D 4400cGy, 22Fr, 31days).

Conclusion: Patient regained her normal bowel habit within 6 months of surgery. After 8 years she was completely symptoms free without any tumor recurrence which supports long term survival and complete functional recovery of spinal cord ependymoma with specific therapy.
